- Communication is a key part of helping our students learn! February Conferences were an important opportunity for families and teachers to keep working as team toward student success.



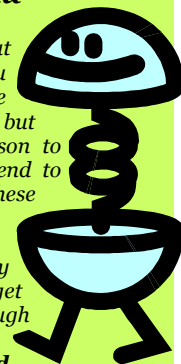
Keep That Spring in Your Step: Avoiding Cold and Flu

Temperatures may be on the rise, but that doesn't mean that cold and flu season is over. Many people believe cold weather causes these illnesses, but they are actually passed from person to person. In the cooler seasons we tend to stay indoors in the drier air, giving these bugs an opportunity to spread.

To prevent an infection, stay away from cold and flu sufferers. You can get a cold from tiny particles sent through the air when the sick person sneezes, coughs, or sniffles. **Frequent and thorough hand washing is the first line of defense in preventing infection!**

If you do happen to come down with the cold, drink lots of fluids, get plenty of rest, and carefully and safely administer over-the-counter cold medications. Influenza can be rougher with high fevers, body aches, and intense coughing. See a doctor if symptoms are severe, last more than seven days, or you develop nausea, diarrhea, or vomiting.

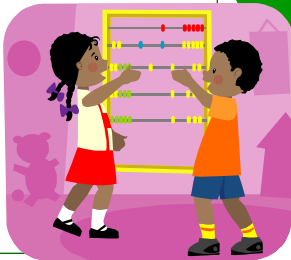


Putting a Little SPARK in our PE Curriculum

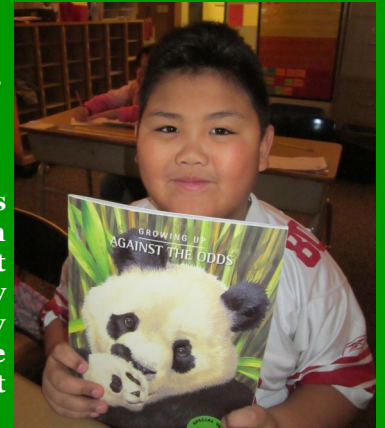
Book Review

Findley is Racing to the Top!

Many of you have probably heard your child talk about their assessment scores and the color that correlates with the score. The four colors are red, orange, yellow, and green. Our goal by the end of the year is to get all Findley students in the green category which represents proficient.

At our last professional development we looked at our average assessment scores and compared them to the district average. Every grade level at Findley averaged higher on their most recent assessment compared to the district average. That's exciting news, so now we continue to set new goals! A teacher made a great comment during this professional development, "I'm thrilled that Findley is performing better than the district average, but I want to know how the highest performing schools in Des Moines are doing and I want Findley to be compared to them, not just the average."
